ABVP Residency in Canine/Feline Specialty

The Canine & Feline Practice category is the largest of ABVP's nine categories, with over 400 veterinarians. Most are in private practice, but a growing number can be found in academia, industry, uniformed services, and other career fields. Diplomates often have advanced equipment and training in their practices to provide the highest-quality care for dogs and cats. Some accept referrals of difficult cases from their colleagues. Diplomates are often featured speakers at continuing education conferences, sharing their knowledge and expertise. A number of Canine and Feline specialists participate in the online community known as VIN (Veterinary Information Network). Diplomates can also be found serving the profession in organizations such as state associations and the national AVMA, including a past president. The Department of Small Animal Clinical Sciences in the Virginia-Maryland College of Veterinary Medicine at Virginia Tech invites applications for a 2-year ABVP residency training program in the specialty of Canine/Feline Practice. This is a unique program at the College of Veterinary Medicine preparing the resident for specialty certification in Canine/Feline clinical practice. The residency program provides training in advanced canine and feline practice to include rotations in community practice, internal and specialty medicine (cardiology, dermatology, neurology, surgery), radiology, and emergency medicine. The resident also will participate in house officer rounds and seminars, and clinical and didactic instruction of veterinary students. The emphasis of the program is to provide advanced clinical and didactic training to prepare the candidate for American Board of Veterinary Practitioners board certification.

Applicants must have completed a 1-year rotating internship or equivalent practice experience. Starting salary is \$37,284. Health benefits and vacation are included.
